



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SECTION 1.—GENERAL

1. This pamphlet gives details of the annual range courses for the following :---

Rifle (miniature and open range). Light machine gun. Anti-aircraft. Field firing. Anti-tank rifle. Pistol. Annual mortar practice.

Each course is divided into parts to suit the various categories of those firing them. They will be fired by :---

Cavalry regiments (horsed)—(Household Cavalry and Cavalry of the Line).

Infantry (rifle) battalions (Footguards and Infantry of the Line).

2. All personnel not "totally exempted" (see para. 7) will fire according to their category, and certain personnel in addition will fire the anti-tank rifle, pistol and mortar courses.

3. The courses are designed to provide progressive training for the soldier, and to make him a practical service shot. After he has been exercised at easy targets, he will be advanced to practices resembling, as far as possible, active service conditions.

- 4. i. The parts of courses to be fired by various categories are shown in Table I.
 - ii. Personnel on the staff of infantry depots (rifle) will fire :—
 - (a) Rifle, Parts II and III.
 - (b) L.M.G., Part I.
 - iii. The pistol course will only be fired by personnel armed with the pistol. Infantry will not fire Part IV.
 - iv. The anti-tank rifle course (see Sec. 7). Three men for each anti-tank rifle on the war establishment of all units will be exercised. Men selected for training should further :---
 - (1) Be those who are likely to be available on mobilization to handle anti-tank rifles.

- (2) Have at least 12 months' service.
- (3) If 2nd year men, be marksmen or 1st class shots.
- (4) If 3rd or subsequent year men, be marksmen or good service shots.

In order to start building up an immediate reserve, efforts should be made to train up to six men a rifle. Extra men should carry out preliminary training, and $\frac{1}{6}$ -scale shooting even if \cdot 55-in. shooting is impracticable.

- v. Annual mortar practice.-See Sec. 8.
- vi. Grenades.—An annual allotment of H.E., smoke and signal grenades is made to each infantry battalion (rifle) and to each infantry depot (rifle) for training and demonstration purposes. (For details of range organization, safety precautions, etc., see Pamphlet No. 13, Sec. 4.)

5. C.O.'s pools.—Ammunition allotted to the C.O.'s 303in. and 38-in. pools will be used in accordance with the following priority list :—

- i. For zeroing rifles and light machine guns.
- ii. For giving extra practice to backward shots and for their subsequent repetition.
- iii. For the fixed line L.M.G. practice.
- iv. For field firing—additional to the 20 rounds .303-in. allotted for each man.
- v. For demonstrations and occasional shots.
- vi. For regimental rifle meetings.
- vii. For practice for competitions.

Pool ammunition is not an individual allotment. The number of rounds available for each weapon should be calculated at the beginning of the weapon training year and allotted by the C.O. for the various purposes for which he wishes it to be expended.

6. Dress and equipment.—The dress and equipment to be worn is laid down in the details of the courses concerned and also in Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, para. 24.

Troops not normally armed with the bayonet will not fire any practices with the bayonet fixed.

7. Total exemptions :---

i. The following will be totally exempted from firing the courses provided that, in the case of N.C.Os. and men, they have been once exercised as 3rd year men in the 1938 course, except that, if they are armed with the pistol, they will fire the pistol course :--Field officers. Captains (optional). Adjutant. Quarter-master. Director of Music. Veterinary officer. All warrant officers. All N.C.Os. above the rank of serjeant. Pipe-major. Bugle-major. Drum-major. Transport serjeant. O.R. serjeant and corporal of horse. Serjeant cook and corporal of horse. Serjeant tailor and corporal of horse. Officer's mess serieant and corporal of horse. Band serieant and corporal of horse. O.R. clerk. Farriers (all ranks). Saddlers (all ranks). Saddle tree makers. Pioneers (all ranks). Soldiers of over 18 years' man's service. Boys (but see Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 1, para. 6). Tailors.

- iii. A brigade commander is authorized to allow total exemptions in the case of men attending courses of instruction the duration of which is six months or more, and any vocational training course. Such exemptions will be granted only in cases where attendance at a course of this nature prevents the individual concerned from being present when his unit is firing its annual course and arrangements cannot be made for him to fire as a casual.

8. Allotment of ammunition and standards of classification.—The allotment of ammunition and the standards of classification are shown in Tables II and III, respectively.

Owing to the peculiarities of certain ranges, it may be necessary to modify the standard "lay-out", and the detail of practices accordingly, for Parts VII and VIII of the rifle course and for Part IV of the L.M.G. course.

The qualifying scores given in Table III are intended for a standard range with normal scoring.

Where a range, owing to the configuration of the ground, does not conform to the standard lay-out, the classification of 3rd and subsequent year men should be based on 60 per cent. of the H.P.S. for marksmen and 35 per cent. of the H.P.S. for service shots. TABLE I

In depots of rifie units where the recruit normally remains at the depot for less than 18 weeks, 60 per cent. will be drawn at the depot and 40 per cent. on his joining his battalion.

1. It is considered that modern conditions on the battlefield will only provide for the rifleman indefinite and fleeting targets at ranges within 600 yards. Accuracy will be more than ever essential. Training is, therefore, designed to make the rifleman :—

- ii. A quick shot, so that he can take one or more snapshots at targets which only appear at short and indefinite intervals.
- iii. Handy with his rifle, so that he can produce for short periods bursts of rapid fire of 5 to 10 rounds, as necessary.

The main object of the course is to train the soldier on the above lines in progressive stages.

1st Year Men

- 2. i. 1st year men will normally fire the miniature rifle course complete, the rifle course, Parts I, II and III, at the depot * and the remainder with the unit.
 - ii. The term "1st year men" includes recruits, and officers on first commission. Such officers, if not at the depot, and boys entering upon their man's service, will fire with the unit those parts of the course which should normally be fired at the depot.*
 - iii. Should no 30-yards or open range be available at the depot, Parts I, II and III will be fired after the recruit joins his unit. Whenever possible all practices of Parts II and III will be fired on an open range.
 - iv. A 1st year man will not normally fire the 2nd year man's course during the same weapon training year as that in which he began to fire his 1st year man's course. 1st year men, however, will normally complete the course by firing Parts IV, V and VI as soon as possible after joining their units from the depot.

i. A steady and accurate service shot.

 $^{\ ^{\}ast}$ In the case of Household Cavalry and Cavalry of the Line (horsed), with the regiment.

A 1st year man, however, who completes his course early in the weapon training year will, after a suitable interval of time during that year, also fire the course prescribed for the 2nd year man.

2nd Year Men

3. The soldier, in his 2nd year, is given ample opportunity to refresh himself at targets having a definite aiming mark. He is then classified on easy targets (Part VI) and later exercised in battle shooting.

3rd and Subsequent Year Men

4. These are allotted 25 rounds each to enable them to sight their rifles at targets with definite aiming marks. C.Os. will decide at what distances this firing will be done. As the entire course for 3rd and subsequent year men is battle shooting, it is important that this sighting should be conscientiously carried out.

Repetitions

- 5. i. Ist year men who repeat practices of the miniature rifle course, or of Part III of the rifle course, will be shown in annual weapon training returns according to their revised classification, and the numbers affected will be stated.
 - ii. Ist year men who classify as 3rd class shots will, after a suitable interval and further preliminary training, repeat Part VI once only, and will be classified on the score thus obtained. They will be shown in the unit weapon training return according to the revised classification, and the number of soldiers affected will be stated.
 - iii. A 2nd year man who classifies as a 3rd class shot, after receiving further instruction, may, at the discretion of his commanding officer be repeated in certain practices or in the whole of Parts VI and VII. He will not be reclassified in that year but his commanding officer may decide whether he is to fire Part VIII in his 3rd year or would benefit by repeating Parts VI and VII instead.
 - iv. Men who fail in 3rd and subsequent years will receive further instruction and repeat Part VIII once only, but they will *not* be reclassified.
 - v. ·303-in. ammunition for repetition will be provided from the C.O.'s pool.

Organization for Firing the Rifle Course

- 7. i. The following suggestions are offered as a guide only. Experience shows that time may be saved by :----
 - (a) Firing men by categories.
 - (b) Conducting those practices of the battle shooting parts of the course which are fired in lanes under centrally controlled regimental or battalion arrangements. This facilitates the provision of the additional personnel needed for the running of these practices.

Thus the system of firing with the unit would be :---

Where this system of firing is adopted, it must be clearly understood that squadron or company commanders are not thereby absolved from their responsibility for the weapon training efficiency of their command.

ii. In the battle shooting parts of the course the range is divided into a firing area (from the 600 to the 300 yards firing points) and a target area (from the 300 yards firing point to and including the butts). The range is further divided into as many parallel lanes as space will allow, each lane being 12 yards wide (i.e. three target frames on a standard range). Targets may appear anywhere in each lane within the target area. For purposes of safety, lanes are marked on the ground by black and white posts and are numbered from left to right. When men are firing in lanes, conducting officers will ensure that each firer and his targets are confined to one lane. Certain practices combine fire and movement, while in others the firers remain stationary. Practices 38 and 39 of Part VII and the whole of Part VIII will be fired in lanes. For all other practices the full target accommodation of the range will be used.

The essence of battle shooting is to practise firers in thinking for themselves. Apart from the initial order to load, no further orders will be given, except the number of rounds to be fired at each target or series of targets. Conducting officers should use ingenuity in varying the order in which targets appear for various details, provided that they do not make conditions appreciably more difficult for one detail than for another.

iii. Figure targets, when exposed from the butts, will appear so that the scoring surface only is seen by the firer, and not the supporting pole.

iv. During the battle shooting practices of the rifle course, conducting officers on the firing point, in the butts and at the control post may find it of assistance to have with them brief instructions on the general lines indicated in the Appendix. These instructions should be framed to suit the particular range and to allow for variations in the positions and in the order of appearance of the various targets.

RIFLE COURSE

Throughout the course firing positions are referred to as (a), (b) and (c) and will be as described below (see Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, para. 28).

(a) Wrist or forearm supported.—(Applicable to elementary instructional practices, such as grouping and first application. Sandbags may be adjusted by the coach to suit the firer.)

(b) In the open.—(No support whatever in any position.)

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

SECTION 3.—THE LIGHT MACHINE GUN COURSE

1. This course is designed to afford practice in developing the qualities required in a light machine gunner, see Pamphlet No. 4, pages 4 and 5.

1st Year Men

2. Ist year men will normally fire Part I at the depot * and the remainder with the unit.

For definition of "1st year men" see Section 2, sub-para. 2, ii.

The instructions contained in Section 2, sub-paras. 2, iii and iv, apply also to the L.M.G. course. Ist year men will normally fire Part I at the depot * and Parts II and III with the unit. But, if there is no 30-yards range at the depot, Part I will be fired with the unit.

Repetitions

3. C.Os. may order backward shots to repeat further practices, but there will be no reclassification.

Coaching

4. See Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, para. 4, and Appendix II.

Organization for firing the L.M.G. Course

5. A system similar to that advocated for the rifle course is recommended, *see* Sec. 2, para. 7. Firing in lanes will only take place in Practice 18.

Penalties for Short Bursts

6. Automatic practices are to be fired in bursts of 4 to 5 rounds. A firer who, in any practice, fires more than one burst of less than 4 rounds will be penalized by the deduction of 5 points for each burst so fired from the score obtained in the practice. The last burst fired is exempt from this penalty. (Not applicable to Part I.)

SECTION 5.—FIELD FIRING.

(See Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, paras. 29-40.)

1. .303-in. ammunition for field firing is allotted on a basis of 20 rounds for each man. This ammunition will be used exclusively for field firing,* except that, if facilities for carrying out field firing do not exist, it may then be used for additional battle shooting.* but for no other purpose.

2. Examples of section exercises are given below, as a guide only. So far as possible, exercises should be framed to bring out the co-operative use of the various platoon weapons, in conjunction with use of ground and formations.

Example No. 1-Rifle

1. Lessons :----

- i. Snapshooting fire orders.
- ii. Control by section commander.
- iii. Fire discipline training :---

 - (a) When executing snapshooting fire order.(b) When under control of section commander.
- iv. Difficulties of controlling section when wearing respirator.

2. Preliminaries :---

- i. Targets .--- A few scattered, skilfully placed figure targets, a target representing an enemy L.M.G., and 7 Figs. 2 representing enemy section advancing extended at close range.
- ii. Firers.-No. 1 Section (without L.M.G.).

iii. Ammunition.-10 rounds for each firer.

3. Situation (explained to section).—

"You are part of an advancing force but have just been held up here (indicates) by enemy fire. Your platoon commander has ordered you to engage all targets appearing on your front."

^{*} The term "battle shooting" refers to the individual practices at service targets fired in the rifle and L.M.G. courses. The term "field firing" refers to collective exercises carried out by

sub-units with ball ammunition on field-firing ranges. These exercises will be drawn up under arrangements made by C.Os. They may be designed on a section, platoon or company basis. Examples of section field firing exercises only are given here.

4. Method of conducting.—Sections are extended in position with rifles loaded.

The section commander is told that he is being sniped by unlocated enemy snipers in a given area (indicate). The conducting officer from time to time causes figure targets to appear cautiously. Next follows a gas alarm, and at that moment an enemy L.M.G. opens fire on the front.

After a suitable interval an enemy section appears advancing in extended order at close range (on a flank if safety permits).

5. Points for discussion (see Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, para. 35).

Method of giving snapshooting fire order.

Vigilance of section in locating targets.

Section commander's control when wearing respirator.

His subsequent fire orders.

Action of men of section.

Fire effect obtained.

Example No. 2-L.M.G. and Smoke

1. Lessons :---

- i. Initiative on the part of section commander.
- ii. Use of ground, fire and manœuvre.
- iii. Combination of fire and use of smoke.
- iv. F.D.T.

2. Preliminaries :---

- i. Targets.-One, representing an enemy M.G.
- ii. Firers.—No. 1 Section (with L.M.G.) and No. 2 Section (3 men only).
- iii. Ammunition.—10 rounds for each rifleman, and 5 magazines of 20 rounds each.

3. Situation.—A platoon, advancing, is surprised in the open by a hitherto unlocated enemy M.G. about 700 yards away, which has suddenly opened fire. As a result, No. 3 Section are all casualties and only 3 men of No. 2 Section (carrying a discharger and 4 smoke grenades) are left. No. 1 Section is intact but all Platoon H.Q., except the runner, are casualties.

4. Method of conducting.-Explain: "You are commanding No. 1 Section, which is using its L.M.G. You are held up by that M.G. (indicated). The platoon commander was coming forward to make a plan of attack when he was killed. But his runner, who was accompanying him, says to you: 'Lt. X was saying at the moment he was hit that the hostile M.G. *must* be taken and that all No. 3 Section and half No. 2 Section are casualties. He added that, when he reached your section's position and saw the ground, he hoped it would be possible to work the L.M.G. forward under cover round the left flank (covered if necessary by the riflemen) to a better fire position, whence it could cover the assault, but that, if the ground did not permit of this, he would have to leave the gun here to cover the riflemen forward.' He added: 'Anyway, No. 2 Section still has 3 men, a discharger and 4 smoke grenades which I can use.'"

As senior remaining N.C.O. of the platoon, draw up and execute your plan.

5. Points for discussion (see Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, para. 35).

Was ground used to best advantage ?

Was gun position suitable ?

What arrangements were made for ammunition with gun? Was line of advance suitable?

Was assault correctly conducted ?

Was smoke used to best advantage ?

What fire effect was obtained by the gun and were the rates of fire correct ?

Example No. 3---L.M.G. and Rifle

Note.—If danger areas permit and suitable positions exist, this exercise may be carried out on the flank of a classification range, targets appearing from the butts.

1. Lessons :---

- i. Application of knowledge of elementary and advanced handling to a tactical situation.
- ii. Need for self-reliance and common sense.

iii. J.D. and ranging by observation.

2. Preliminaries :---

- i. Targets .---
 - No. 1-Enemy L.M.G.
 - No. 2—Enemy section extended. 6 Figs. 2 (to be replaced by 6 Figs. 4 as soon as rifle section opens fire).

3. Situation.—Explain to the rifle section :—

"Your company is fighting a strenuous rear-guard action. Nos. 1 and 2 platoons are acting as rear party and have been ordered to hold off the enemy at all costs for at least 20 minutes.

Both platoons are being heavily engaged.

You are No. 3 Section (position indicated), and No. 2 Section is about 80 yards to your left (indicated).

You receive the following message from Platoon Commander :---

'No. 2 Section on your left has stopped firing. Presume all are casualties. Fire from L.M.G. urgent in order to hold off enemy. Send two of your section to get the gun into action immediately.'"

4. Method of conducting :---

- i. Practice begins when two riflemen are ordered to get the L.M.G. into action.
- ii. As soon as these two riflemen go off on their task, targets Nos. 1 and 2 appear.
- iii. As soon as No. 2 target is engaged by No. 3 section, the 6 Figs. 2 will be replaced by 6 Figs. 4. The latter will be exposed for 5 secs. at irregular intervals and alternately in twos or threes (to represent enemy taking snapshots), and will continue to be so exposed, whether hit or not, till the end of the practice.

(No. 3 section will not be allowed to fire at either No. 1 or No. 3 targets.)

iv. When No. 1 target is hit, it will be lowered and No. 3 exposed. This will also be lowered if hit.

- v. The practice will end when both L.M.G. targets have been hit or, alternatively, when all ammunition has been expended.
- vi. The exercise can be repeated for other members of No. 3 section.

5. Points for discussion (see Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, para. 35).

- i. How did situation present itself to section commander? Did he act quickly and clearly? Did he detail two riflemen nearest No. 2 section? Did he send or consider sending second in command of section as one of the two men detailed to fire gun?
- ii. Was best route to gun selected? (Time? Speed? Cover?) (Do not give away gun's position by going straight to it.)
- iii. Did they realize gun must be moved away from its present position—(alternative position)? Did they make mistake of both going up to position to move gun back?
- iv. Was there any co-ordination of duties? Did No. 1 think of looking for ammunition on No. 1 while on gun position? Meanwhile, what was No. 2 doing? Did he think of looking for ammunition on dead men? Or did he think of helping No. 1 in finding new position for gun?
- v. Did No. 1 examine gun behind cover? Was wallet removed from No. 1?
- vi. Position selected—was it good ? Was gun correctly mounted in it ? Was there any exposure in moving into it ?
- vii. Was J.D. and correction of range by observation done well ?
- viii. What fire effect was obtained ?

SECTION 6.—THE PISTOL COURSE

General

1. The course is designed to practise individuals in delivering fire instantly by sense of direction. The speed at which one or more effective shots can be fired is more important than the close grouping of the shots.

2. To obtain full value from this course, a period of about one week should be devoted to preliminary practice in holding and snapping with an empty pistol before firing with live ammunition.

Range Discipline and Safety Precautions

3. See Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, and Pamphlet No. 11, Lesson 1.

Grouping Practices

4. If faults are revealed in the first grouping practice, the second one will not be fired until these faults have been corrected by further instruction. Before men are allowed to shoot by sense of direction only, their individual ability in trigger pressing and holding must be ascertained. For this reason, sights will be used when firing the grouping practices.

Misfires and Jams

5. See Pamphlet No. 1, Sec. 3, para. 27.

Mounted Practices


6. For preliminary training, see Pamphlet No. 11, Lesson 6.

7. The squad, dismounted, will be formed as shown in Fig. 2. Each practice will be explained by the instructor before it is fired. He will then order "Load". This will be done in the normal way, placing the left arm through the reins. On the order "No. 1, Mount", "No. 1, Right Turn", "Walk March", "On the Target—Canter", No. 1 will move out from the right, at the pace laid down for the practice, fire one shot at each target, return the pistol to the case and approach the left flank of the squad at the trot, taking up his position on that flank.

When the targets have been checked and hits recorded, this process will be repeated for the other members of the squad. Firers will then dismount and pistols will be inspected.

8. Targets will be placed at 20 yards' interval and about 7 yards outside the track, facing the firing points. The firing

point for each target will be a point on the track about 10 yards from the target. Targets will be square to the firing points, according as the direction of the firer's approach is from the left or from the right (see Fig. 2).

SECTION 7.—THE ANTI-TANK RIFLE COURSE (PROVISIONAL)

(See Pamphlet No. 5, General, para. 5.)

1. The course is designed to give practice in firing at :--

- i. Crossing targets.
- ii. Fleeting (snapshooting) targets.

2. On account of the high penetrative powers and the great range of the anti-tank rifle, safety considerations on many range areas prohibit fire with $\cdot 55$ ammunition. Part I of the course is, therefore, designed to overcome this difficulty. The size of the target, its speed, and the range, are reduced to $\frac{1}{5}$ those of the normal.


Part I is also intended to enable men to practise aiming and swinging under the simplest conditions before they fire -55-in. ammunition for the first time.

3. Part II will then be fired with \cdot 55-in. ammunition on an anti-tank rifle range. In stations at or near which anti-tank rifle ranges do not exist and where arrangements cannot be made for men to proceed to an anti-tank range to practise, men will fire up to 5 rounds of \cdot 55-in. ammunition, at 25 yards, into the stop butt of a classification range, to accustom them to the effect of such firing.

•55-in. ammunition will never be fired on a 30-yards range unless it has been passed for this purpose.

4. On anti-tank rifle ranges where targets are placed in the open, the following system of signalling will be employed :----

The target will be so placed that men in a pit to a flank can see the shot-holes. At the firing point is a duplicate target. Both targets are divided into 1-ft. squares (see Fig. 3). These squares will be numbered from left to right, and from bottom to top. Thus, on the arrival of a shot on the target, the markers in the pit notify the firing point by telephone of its position by indicating, on the lines of an ordinary map reference, the square in which the shot-hole lies. If, therefore, a shot arrives on the target at "X" (see Fig. 3), the marker merely telephones "Square 34". The position of the shot is then plotted on the target at the firing point. 5. The dimensions of the silhouette tank target will be issued.

1. Annual mortar firing differs from the firing of the other weapons in the rifle battalion in that it cannot be regarded as a range course, nor is it a test for individual members of the mortar platoon.

It is designed to practise the fire controllers and their understudies in the engagement of targets with H.E. and in the method of producing a smoke screen.

The annual allotment of ammunition is laid down by the War Office and this ammunition is for the use of fire controllers only to carry out the shoots enumerated below.

The tables given in this section are based on the allotment for 1937-38 and it will be noted that in no case is there sufficient ammunition to fire for effect with H.E. or for the actual production of a smoke screen.

The H.E. allotment is sufficient for the complete process of ranging on a point target, and the smoke allotment allows the fire controller to decide accurately on the position of his point of origin.

Where the range restricts a unit to powder-filled bombs only, the smoke shoots should be carried out as area H.E. shoots.

The annual practice is divided into three parts as enumerated below.

2. Part I.

- i. Object.—The engagement of point targets to exercise untrained fire controllers and understudies in the rules of ranging.
- ii. General.—The ammunition allotted will normally be fired by N.C.Os. who have recently been posted to the mortar platoon and have not controlled mortar fire with live ammunition, and by detachment
 orderlies and selected private soldiers who are about to be promoted and remain in the mortar platoon.

In all shoots the mortar should be within easy voice control of the O.P. and only simple point targets should be engaged.

iii. Conduct.—(a) The fire controllers to be exercised should be assembled near the O.P. under the platoon commander in a position from which they can hear the fire control orders and observe the fire. On the conclusion of each shoot the platoon commander will discuss the orders given. (b) The spare mortar numbers of the whole platoon should be assembled near the mortar under the platoon serjeant in a position from which they can watch the drill and fire discipline. On the conclusion of each shoot the platoon serjeant will point out the mistakes made and change round the detachment at the mortar prior to the next shoot.

3. Part II.

- i. Object.—The neutralization of small areas with H.E. or the screening of areas with smoke after bringing the mortar into action under service conditions.
- ii. General.—The ammunition allotted will normally be fired by the detachment commanders and detachment corporals of the platoon.
- iii. Conduct.—The tactical situation will be given to the fire controller by an officer representing the rifle commander under whom the mortar detachment has been placed. On the conclusion of each exercise the platoon commander will comment on :—

(a) The selection of the O.P., base plate position and position in readiness.

(b) The occupation of the position.

(c) The engagement of the target.

The platoon serjeant will note mistakes made in drill.

4. Part III.

- i. Object.—As for Part II, introducing the employment of two mortar detachments under one rifle commander.
- ii. General.—The ammunition allotted will normally be fired by the detachment commanders and detachment corporals of the platoon.
- iii. Conduct.—The tactical situation will be given to the mortar section commander by an officer representing the rifle commander under whom the mortar section has been placed, and each exercise will be so conducted that both detachments are leap-frogged into action in turn. In other respects the conduct of these exercises is the same as in Part II.

5. Ammunition, Parts II and III.—The nature of the ammunition allotted to Parts II and III may be changed about at the discretion of the platoon commander so that some smoke shoots may be fired in Part II and some area shoots in Part III, but every fire controller exercised should be given one area shoot and one smoke shoot.

6. Safety precautions at the mortar position :--

- i. At all practices a safety officer will be detailed whose duty it is to see that all mortars are laid safely as regards line and elevation. He will also observe movements of aircraft in the vicinity and, if an aircraft is flying so as to approach the line of fire, he will delay firing until it is clear. (Aircraft flying at over 2,500 feet are safe.)
- ii. In addition to the safety officer, one full rank N.C.O. will be detailed to each mortar. His duty is to see that each bomb is fired with the charge ordered, and that the safety cap is removed before the bomb is placed in the barrel.

A N.C.O. will watch for blinds and immediately report their approximate location to the senior officer present. As mortar range danger areas may also be used for manœuvre purposes by troops, it is of great importance that unlocated blind projectiles do not accumulate.

- 7. Procedure for destroying blind projectiles :-
 - i. On no account will mortar personnel make any attempt to destroy blinds.

ii. Procedure :---

- (a) Mark the blind projectile with a red flag.
- (b) Report its location to higher authority through the usual channels.
